#### From one of our Elders

Previously, Andrew said that there is a treasure (gift) in all of us, what that treasure is only God truly knows, but with prayer we can discern it and use that treasure to further the work of the Church.

The Christian Motorcyclists Association UK. (CMA) was formed in the UK. about 30 years ago. It has for many years held a 'Holy Joes' (an alcohol and drug-free tea and coffee marquee usually about 25ft by 12ft) at many secular motor cycle rallies across the UK. Further activities are 'Helmet Parks' at race meetings etc, 'Breakfast Runs' (very popular) and church visits (you get to see all sorts), the whole purpose is to get alongside secular bikers in a non-threatening way, to start conversations etc.

The most common is by far and away is the Holy Joes, this contains a tea and coffee bar and tables and chairs and since a lot of the activity is at night, it is well lit.

Hot water for the drinks comes from gas urns mounted within a steel frame for safety, drinks are served by CMA volunteers, drink payment usually on a 'donations' basis, this usually decided prior to the event if 'traders' are also present at the rally. In the seating area are usually a further group of CMA volunteers acting as hosts.

As already stated most activity is at night, when the rally bar has finally closed and the bands finished, most of the bikers are still buzzing and descend on Holy Joes for a night cap and a chat, at a very large rally I have seen six urns emptied in a very short period of time there is always a lot of banter between the rally bikers and the CMA and the rally bikers will sit and drink and chat until the late small hours. After all a good motorcycle rally is always about the 'craic'.

Conversations vary, starting with best available new bikes, old classic bikes, previous rallies and trips, accidents, the police etc, as the evening wears on they often turn to more serious matters and more personal and private questions.

It is not unusual for a small number of separate serious conversations to continue until dawn, one urn is left on low ready to be opened up for the breakfast rush much later in the day. But from these small beginnings many have come to the Lord, and a large number of difficult personal questions been answered, the seeds have been sown.

So, in many ways Holy Joes is just like our church, and like the church, to continue it needs people with a great variety of gifts to keep it successful.

It is not everybody can sit quietly and listen to a hairy old biker opening up about the loss of a life time partner, and trying to translate that 'Scouse' accent at three o'clock in the morning, is just plain hard work.

All this having put in a full day at work, helped unloaded the trailer of a marquee, six gas urns, and twelve gas bottles etc, then had to help erect the marquee in the pouring rain and been told the tap for the water is over two hundred meters down the hill!

But some people do have that gift and can offer solace, to the lost, others are quite happy to spend the whole weekend hauling the water drums up the hill to keep the ever emptying urns topped up, whilst others are quite happy to stand behind the bar serving gallons of tea and coffee to a seemingly endless number of the ebullient rally biker customers who are still buzzing, trying to carry on three conversations at once, and make up their mind on how many cups of coffee they want (and the bar is three deep). Or perhaps you are good at judging how well the gas cylinders are going; you have to get the very last ounce of gas out of each cylinder or if we have enough sugar (bikers have a very sweet tooth) to last the whole weekend.

Most of the volunteers will have arrived on their own motorbikes and pitched their own tents, many will cook their own meals. Some volunteers never even get to the rally, and assist by loading and unloading the trailer where the kit is stored. It's only Friday night, and we have the whole weekend to go. At least we do not have to put the marquee up tomorrow.

Not your usual church duties, but other than that, just like a normal church, perhaps the 'flock' is a bit rougher about the edges but the rally bikers are also our brothers and sisters but 'just do not know it yet'.

So, looking for those gifts within ourselves is very important. There are many ways that the load can be shared, and it does not matter how small the gift is, two or three can gather together and help reduce the load.

#### **Church Secretary's review of 2021**

I didn't manage to prepare a review of the year for the Dec/Jan issue of 'Contact' so I apologise for the delay. Anyway, here it is now!

We give thanks to God for all that has been positive in our church life during 2021, despite the fact that the Corona virus continues to disrupt our lives. We have looked after each other very well. Thank you to those who have given so much time and love in making others feel supported – it has been very much appreciated. We look forward to facing the challenges and enjoying the blessings that we will face as Christian folk, brothers and sisters in our church family, as we move into the new year in 2022. The church closed for worship at the end of March 2020. It was open again during October and November with videos on the screen instead of a minister 'in person'. However, circumstances forced us to close the building again at the beginning of December and we were not able to meet in person until Pentecost Sunday, May 23<sup>rd</sup> 2021 – a significant day for returning to God's house for worship. I don't think anyone anticipated that we would still be wearing masks, taking lateral flow tests and keeping our distance from one another in January 2022, almost two years after the first lockdown.

We have been, and continue to be, blessed with a high standard of ministry from Andrew and our worship team and from visiting and 'in house' preachers and we thank all those who have shared their gifts with us. We thank Richard and Malvolia Benham too. They were leading evening worship before the lockdown but have not been able to continue. Andrew and Candid have had a challenging year as they have had to juggle adjusting to being new parents, to work and to child care in a situation which is not ideal, having been complicated by Covid. We are also aware that Andrew is a minister to two churches which are 45 minutes journey time apart and has to give some of his time to the Synod in addition to the 40% for us and for Daventry. Please continue to pray for the family and give thanks for Andrew's leadership and ministry to us. Oh – and I would encourage you all to read, or read again Andrew's message of encouragement for us all in the recent Dec/Jan issue of the 'Contact' magazine.

Probably the greatest challenge that our church fellowship has to face is the question of how we discern God's will as we seek to move our church forward and this has been a high priority on the church meeting agenda and also in our prayer life. We have had several opportunities during the last year to discuss, share our thoughts and pray about this. Andrew, and others, have also preached on this theme on several occasions. Please continue to pray and seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit as we move into 2022. We have big decisions to make this year and all of us are called to play our part in one way or another whether it is in prayer and encouragement or practical support in commitment of time and talents. We are all part of the body of Christ. Andrew's letter in the June 'Contact' includes the following words: "My prayers and desires are to be part of a Church that is aware that we have been given the Holy Spirit to empower us to serve God in whatever capacity as opportunities come our way. We should walk and serve in confidence knowing that we have been empowered to do God's work". A new prayer group on a Thursday morning at 11am in the church foyer has recently been set up specifically to pray for the future of our church and your support would be welcome.

Sadly, we have lost some of the members of our church family during 2021. Cynthia Bowler, John Mason, Marjorie Newton and Jan Davys were all long standing members of the church. Fortunately, it was possible for three of their funeral services to be held in the church in 2021. Some families were not able to have a service in the church for their loved ones during 2020 and early 2021 so a further service of remembrance for those we have lost during the past two years was held on Remembrance Sunday in November and was much appreciated by those members of the families who took part. Please remember all the families in your prayers. Please remember also our leader of the uniformed organisations, Carol Lynch, whose husband died last year, Zoya and Ferrand who both lost parents during the lockdown and were unable to travel to be with the family, and also Heather Crick who lost her father recently. Several of our members have had health problems during the year and we remember them too.

Give thanks for the work that Rachel does as our youth and family worker. Much of it is behind the scenes so please take time to ask her how she is getting on and give her some encouragement and support when she needs it. The Sunday Sprouts and Wednesday Sparklers groups are now up and running again and the new Bumps and Babies group meet on a Monday. Please pray for her ministry with all these groups and for all the work that Rachel does with schools and in conjunction with the council. The Snapdragon event, the Classic Car Rally and Christmas lights switch-on and Car Trail were events where she/we had an opportunity to reach out to the people of Hinckley. Thank you to all those who serve, and pray for, our church in many different ways. Your ministry is much appreciated.

As 2022 progresses we look forward to a year of fellowship and service in Christian love. Ask God to help us discern his will for our church, to empower us in his Holy Spirit and ask the question 'What can I do to share the love of Jesus with others and play my part in his body, the church?'

May God bless us all as we seek to grow His church here in Hinckley.

#### What have you learnt?

At times for the first School Assembly back after Christmas I would take a large plastic box and talk about packing away Christmas and putting the box back in the loft. Is that what we should do? Forget about Christmas until December?

Have we learned anything new this past Christmas? Have you been inspired by what you read or heard? Have you been encouraged in your faith by listening to God's voice or reading His word?

Put a tick at the end of this sentence if you can answer YES to any of the questions.

Here are a few ideas that I have found during the past weeks...

The Angel of the Lord visited Zechariah to tell him about the birth of John the Baptist. The Angel said "Do not be Afraid". The angel Gabriel said those words when speaking to tell Mary that she was to be the mother of Jesus. On the Bethlehem hillside the Shepherds were "terrified" at the arrival of the Angel of the Lord. "Do not be afraid" they were told. Now this is much easier to say than do. On all these occasions it was a new experience for the people concerned. As our faith develops God may call us to do new things! He may even say, "Do not be afraid"!

The Shepherds heard the words of the Angel, they responded to the suggestion they go and find the Baby, so they sought Him, found Him and then Praised Him. And that was not the end... they told all they met what they had seen and heard. This was their testimony! We all have a testimony to tell those we meet of what Jesus has done for us. Our Hope tells us what we can expect from Jesus in the future.

In a family discussion we had over Christmas our daughter asked, "What did Mary and Joseph do with the gold the wise men presented to them?" Her answer was that it paid for their journey to Egypt. I asked "how did the gift come? Was it in a block or coins?" They would have been very vulnerable as they journeyed to Egypt, even more so if people realised they were carrying gold! Perhaps the way we live our lives as Christian men and women make us vulnerable at times!

Luke writes (ch2 v21) On the eighth day, when it was time to circumcise him(Jesus), he was named Jesus, the name the angel had given him before he had been conceived. Whilst in the Temple in Jerusalem they met Simeon, he was a Godly man who was filled with the Spirit. Simeon took Jesus in his arms and praised God. Amongst the words he spoke were... a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel."

There in his arms was the light of the world, the light for the whole world, Jews and Gentles. For me here is confirmation that Jesus had come for me, and for you. For the whole world. Not just for the Jewish people of Jesus day.

Here is my big tick at the end of the line...

Well at this point I stopped typing and thought I would leave this article for the Church "Contact" and then in a few days come back to it before sending it to David, the editor.

During this time I read in my Bible Reading Notes (Encounter with God) for Wednesday 29<sup>th</sup> December I read the following... "As we move away from Christmas and prepare to enter another year, what have you learnt that you could take into the new year? Pray that Jesus will accompany you"

We know about co-incidents, but this is a God-Incident.

These notes had been written by John Grayston some months ago. Here for me was confirmation that I should send this article to David. A copy is also going to Scripture Union, the publisher of the notes, and to John Grayston.

Dear George,

I do love these 'God-incidences', which speak to us and confirm his direction. I am so glad that my comment gave you the confirmation that you needed.

My favourite goes back many years to the time I was editing the adult reading notes and we had a letter from a missionary in Uganda who had been picked up and held during one of Idi Amin's purges. She had said to the Lord that she really needed something clear from her Daily Bread reading, turned to it and found it was Acts 12, Peter's escape from prison, a passage which would have been chosen years before. She was released in a day or two

The footnote is that some years after receiving the letter I was leading a workshop at LICC and told the story to illustrate a point I was making only to have a lady come up to me at the end and reveal that she was the correspondent!

#### Book Review - David Sheppard Batting for the Poor

Author: Andrew Bradstock

I was given this book as a Christmas present and found it very interesting. It is the authorized biography of David Sheppard (1929-2005) the Sussex and England cricketer who gave up the game to enter the Anglican priesthood, eventually becoming the Bishop of Liverpool. The author is an emeritus professor of the University of Winchester and has held positions within the URC – and is a cricket fan!

The book tells of Sheppard's privileged upbringing, his father was a solicitor, and his mother came from a wealthy family. Sheppard attended boarding school at Sherborne College and gained an exhibition to Trinity Hall, Cambridge, although this had to wait until he completed his National Service. As a schoolboy Sheppard became a cricket fanatic and would play and watch the game whenever he could, eventually making his first-class debut for Sussex in 1946.

It was at Cambridge University, in 1949, where he underwent a conversion to evangelical Christianity. He became heavily involved in the Christian Union and was always seeking opportunities to talk about his faith and persuade his fellow students to become Christians. The Christian Union dissuaded its members from getting involved in political or social activity seeing it as a distraction from making new converts. The following year Sheppard made his Test debut for England against West Indies. After leaving Cambridge he concentrated on his cricket career before realising that he was being called to the Anglican Ministry. He studied at Ridley Hall, Cambridge and in 1955 began his curacy in Islington. The following year he was ordained priest, at St Paul's Cathedral, and in 1957 he married his wife, Grace. (The book talks in some detail about their marriage and Grace's health issues).

He then became Warden of the Mayflower Family Centre in Canning Town which was an inner-city community project. Here he began to see the needs of the poorer people in society and how the gospel might be relevant to them. He still had time to play first-class cricket and even toured Australia with the MCC. His involvement with cricket carried on beyond his playing days. He was at the centre of the 'Doliveira affair' in 1968 – where because of Basil Doliveira's race, the South African authorities didn't want him to be selected to play for England. Sheppard was wholly opposed to the tour going ahead and campaigned publicly against it. Subsequently, he was a

leading campaigner for the sporting boycott of South Africa while their apartheid policies were in place, earning him both criticism and commendation – with Desmond Tutu becoming a great friend.

In 1969 he became Bishop of Dulwich and in 1975 was installed as Bishop of Liverpool. Here he forged a great ecumenical partnership with the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Liverpool, Derek Worlock, as well as with the Free Church leaders, especially Dr John Newton, a Methodist. Frequently, the three of them spoke up for Liverpool and highlighted the poverty and deprivation that blighted parts of the city. In 1985 Sheppard was one of the authors of the Church of England Report Faith in the City which drew the ire of the Conservative government led by Margaret Thatcher. The report claimed that government policy was responsible, at least in part, for the poverty in the inner-cites and other urban areas and suggested alternative policies which went against government thinking at the time.

The church leaders also had prominent roles responding to the tragedies at Heysel and Hillsborough stadiums involving supporters of Liverpool FC.

David Sheppard retired in 1997 and became a life peer in 1998, sitting on the Labour benches in the House of Lords. He died in 2005 the day before his 76<sup>th</sup> birthday having suffered from cancer for a number of years.

What was interesting about this book for me, was how Sheppard's faith developed. Although he disliked labels, he was always happy to be associated with the evangelical tradition, but in a letter he wrote in 1990 he said "I would not now be seen as a "true blue" by conservative evangelicals. I still hope that at the heart of my ministry is what the word evangelical should stand for: the Gospel of *Grace*". And to quote the author of the book:

He [Sheppard] always believed that people needed to respond to the love of Christ individually, as he had done as a student, but he came to see salvation having a communal dimension as well.

It is a stimulating book, especially if you like cricket, and have an interest in how Christianity interacts with politics and our mission to the world. David Crick

#### **Recalling the Ministry for November21-January22**

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In reflection on the message from <u>Sunday 21<sup>st</sup> Nov.</u> **Answering God's Call.** Extracts from Jeremiah 1, v1-10. **The Call of Jeremiah**.

v4f: The word of the LORD came to me saying,

Extracts from 1 Thessalonians, 3, v 9-13. Paul Speaks to the People:

v 9: How can we thank God enough for you in return for all the joy we have in the presence of our God because of you?

v12: May the Lord make your love increase and overflow for each other and for everyone else just as ours does for you.

Congregation members brought forward toys for charity. Children celebrated with dancing.

Extracts from Luke's Gospel, 2, v 1 -18. The Birth of Jesus.

v1f: In those days Caesar Augustus issued a decree that a census should be taken

of the entire Roman world . .. So Joseph went up ...to Bethlehem the town of David.

∨5: He went there to register with Mary...who was expecting a child...While they were there ...

she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no guest room.

v8: And there were shepherds...keeping watch over their flock at night.

V13: Suddenly a company of the heavenly host appeared... praising God and saying

"Glory to God in the Highest Heaven"

V16f: (The shepherds) hurried off and found Mary and Joseph and the baby lying in the manger.

When they had seen him they spread the word and all who heard were amazed.

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In reflection on the message from Second Sunday in Advent, 5<sup>th</sup> Dec.

Partnering with God The Second Advent Candle, For Hope, was lit.

Call to Worship from Philippians, 1, v 1-7. Paul Says to the People:

v 3: I thank my God every time I remember you.
v 4: In all my prayers for all of you, I always pray with joy
v 5: because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day...
v 7: It is right for me to feel this way about all of you, since I have you in
my heart. Extracts from Jeremiah, 29, v 1 -14. Jeremiah's letter to the exiles
in Babylon.

v4: This is what the LORD Almighty says...
v 5f: Build houses and settle down...Marry and have sons and daughters...

and grandchildren and great grandchildren. Increase in number there, do not decrease.

v 7: Also, seek the peace and prosperity of the city...Pray to the LORD for it.

v 10: This is what the LORD says: "When seventy years are completed...
I will come and fulfil my promise to bring you back to this place
(Jerusalem)"

The service was followed by the Church's AGM.

The Third Advent Candle, **For Joy**, was lit.

Welcome, John 1: The Word Became Flesh Extracts from Luke 1 v 39-56. Mary Visits Elizabeth.

v39: At that time Mary got ready and hurried to...Judea,

v40: where she entered Zechariah's home and greeted Elizabeth.

v41: When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the baby leaped in her womb,

and Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit.

v42: In a load voice she exclaimed, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the child you will bear!"...

v46f: And Mary said; "My soul glorifies the Lord and my spirit rejoices in God my Saviour..."

v56: Mary stayed with Elizabeth for about three months and then returned home. Extracts from Luke 4, v 16-21, v16f: Jesus went to Nazareth...

and on the Sabbath day he went into the synagogue, as was his custom.

He stood up to read and the scroll of the prophet Isiah was handed to him.

Unrolling it, he found the place where it is written:

v18: "The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because
he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor..."

Completing the passage, v20: Then he rolled up the scroll...and sat down.

The eyes of everyone...were fastened on him.

v21: He began by saying to them, "Today this scripture is fulfilled in your hearing."

The Address was entitled: "What's in the box?"

This title was discussed in the context of: "Who was The Baby in the Crib?"

In the first scripture Elizabeth realises how blessed Mary's child is and Mary's Song (v 46-55) expresses this.

In the second scripture, Jesus, grown up, is anointed by the Spirit of the Lord and becomes the Son of God.
