

Recalling the Ministry for April - May 2022

(As largely seen on the Church Web Site as THE WEDNESDAY WORD)

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In reflection on the message for Easter Sunday 17th April 2022

Extracts from Hebrews 4, v 11-16 Jesus the Great High Priest.
v11: Let us, therefore, make every effort to enter that rest,
so that no one will perish by following their example of disobedience.
v12: For the word of God is alive and active.
Sharper than any double-edged sword, it penetrates
even to dividing soul and spirit, joints and marrow;
it judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart.

v13: Nothing in all creation is hidden from God's sight. Everything is uncovered and laid bare before the eyes of him to whom we must give account.

v14: Therefore, since we have a great high priest who has ascended into heaven, Jesus the Son of God, let us hold firmly in the faith we profess.

v15: For we do not have a high priest who is unable to empathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who has been tempted in every way, just as we are – yet he did not sin.

v16: Let us then approach God's throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need.

Sermon: We have a high priest (What makes us Church Part 5) Part 4 noted that because the temple curtain was torn in two at Jesus death, we have access to Jesus, the Great High Priest. Thus, because Jesus had lived with us on earth, yet did not sin, Jesus can empathize with our weaknesses, and died as a sacrifice for our sins, even for us Gentiles. And, for our belief in him, as righteous children of God, Jesus remembers us and so we will be raised to eternal life with him.

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In reflection on the message for Sunday 24th April 2022

Extracts from John's Gospel, 21, v 15-19 Jesus Reinstates Peter
To put the reading into context, note v14: This was now the third time
Jesus appeared to his disciples after he was raised from the dead.
v15: When they had finished eating, Jesus said to Simon Peter,
"Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?"
"Yes, Lord, you know that I love you." Jesus said, "Feed my lambs."
v16: Again Jesus said, "Simon son of John, do you love me?"
"Yes, Lord, you know that I love you." Jesus said, "Take care of my sheep."
v17: The third time he said to him, "Simon son of John, do you love me?"
Peter was hurt because Jesus asked him a third time.

He said, "Lord, you know all things; you know that I love you."

Jesus said," Feed my sheep."

v18: Jesus said, "Very truly I tell you, when you were younger you dressed yourself

and went where you wanted; but when you are old you will stretch out your hands,

and someone else will dress you and lead you where you do not want to go." v19: Jesus said this to indicate the kind of death by which Peter would glorify God.

Then he said to him, "Follow me!"

The Address, entitled **People**, considered the many **people** Jesus met during the days during Holy Week. Jesus knew what was going to happen to him. Jesus knew (Matthew, Ch. 26) the chief priests had a plot to kill him, including the betrayal by Judas Iscariot and Peter's triple denial "before the rooster crows" said Jesus "after I have risen." God is in charge, always: Jesus would die on the cross as a sacrifice for our (the **people's**) sins and would rise from the dead with the promise of everlasting life for his **people**.

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In reflection on the message from Sunday 1st May 2022,

During the service, a poem by Doreen Harrison. "A bouquet of blessings" was read and the bible story in Judges Ch.12, v5-6, was used to introduce the theme of the message which was how important **Words** are, as in the Bible Reading which was extracts from John 1, 1-18, **The Word Became Flesh.**

v1f: In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning.
v3f: Through him all things were made. In him was life, and that life was the light of all mankind.
v5: The light shines in the darkness.

v6f: There was a man sent from God whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify concerning that light, so that through him all might believe.

v8: He himself was not the light; he came only as a witness to the light. v9: The true light that gives light to everyone was coming into the world. v10: He was in the world, and though the world was made through him, the world did not recognize him.

v12: To all who did receive him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to be called children of God—
v13: children born not of natural descent... but born of God.
v14: The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us.
We have seen his glory, the glory of the one and only Son,

who came from the Father, full of grace and truth.
v18: No one has ever seen God, but the one and only Son, who is himself God
and is in closest relationship with the Father, has made him known.

Talk: The Power of the Word – Light.

The reading is about the coming of Jesus "The **light** that shines in the darkness." **Jesus is the Light of the World**, so in becoming a Christian one moves out of the darkness and into the **light** and **love** of Jesus.

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In reflection on the message from Sunday 8th May 2022,

Extracts from a Bible Reading from Mark's Gospel, 5, 21-43, Jesus Raises a Dead Girl and Heals a Sick Women v21f: When Jesus crossed to the other side of the lake, a large crowd gathered. Then one of the synagogue leaders, Jairus, fell at his feet and pleaded, "My daughter is dying. Please come and put your hands on her so that she will be healed and live." v25f: A woman who had been subject to bleeding for twelve years... came up behind him and touched his cloak. v29f: Immediately her bleeding stopped...At once, Jesus realized that the power had gone from him, and asked, "Who touched my clothes?" Jesus looked around to see, v33f: The woman, knowing what had happened, came and fell at his feet, trembling. Jesus said to her, "Daughter, your faith has healed you. Go in peace." v35f: People came from Jairus' house. "Your daughter is dead," they said. "Why bother the teacher." Overhearing, Jesus said, "Don't be afraid; just believe." Jesus entered the house and said, "The child is not dead but asleep." v41f: Jesus took her by the hand and said to her, "Talitha koum!" (meaning "Little girl, I say to you, get up!"). Immediately, the girl stood up and began to walk around. At this all were completely astonished. Jesus told them to give her something to eat.

Sermon: **Compassion** (suffer with). Jesus showed compassion for Jairus and the sick woman. We show compassion for refugees and the needy. Christian Aid Week is a time for us to show compassion. Like the power 'gone from Jesus' in the scripture, our donations are the power which helps the needy, helping to bring God's justice, helping the richer to help the poorer.

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In reflection on the message from Sunday 15th May 2022,

Extracts from a Bible Readings from Luke's Gospel, 24, 13-27 & 28-35 On the Road to Emmaus

v13f: Now that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus. They were talking with each other about everything that had happened.
Jesus came up to them, but they were kept from recognising him.
v17f: He asked them, "What are you discussing together as you walk along?"
They stood still, their faces downcast. One of them, Cleopas, asked him,
"Are you the only one visiting Jerusalem who does not know
the things that have happened there in these days?"
v19f: "What things?" he asked. "About Jesus of Nazareth," they replied.
They explained how the chief priests and the rulers handed over a prophet
to be sentenced to death and they crucified him three days ago.
They explained they had hoped that he would have redeemed Israel.
v22f: Our women amazed us. They went to the tomb,
but did not find the body and saw angels who said he was alive.
v24: Others went to the tomb and found it just as the women said.
They did not see Jesus.

v25: So Jesus said to the two men, "How foolish you are and how slow to believe all that the prophets have spoken! v26: Did not the Messiah have to suffer these things then enter his glory?" v27: He explained all what was said in all the scriptures concerning himself. v28f: As they approached the village...they urged him strongly, "Stay with us for it is nearly evening." So he went in.

v30f: When he was at the table with them, he took bread, gave thanks, broke it and began to give it to them. Then their eyes were opened and they recognized him, and he disappeared from their sight.

v32: "Were not our hearts burning within us while he talked with us on the road and opened the scriptures to us?"

v33f: They got up and returned at once to Jerusalem. There they found the Eleven

and those with them, assembled together and saying, "It is true!

The Lord has risen and has appeared to Simon."

v35: Then the two told what had happened on the way,
and how Jesus was recognised by them when he broke the bread.

Sermon: **The Resurrection Miracle.** The sermon revisited the scripture story where Jesus joins the two men walking to Emmaus and pointed out how slow they were to believe all the prophecies concerning himself. In the village, the breaking of the bread revealed the truth that the two had met Christ, who had risen. This was confirmed in Jerusalem later.

Thereafter, we received the bread in the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Brian Beagley
