What a Witness

Hinckley & Burbage Churches Together 2025 Walk of Witness

Good Friday 2025 saw Christians from across the community walk together through Hinckley in remembrance of the crucifixion of Jesus Christ.



Many of the churches across Hinckley & Burbage were represented as hundreds walked from St Peter's RC Church, down Castle Street to the Market Square. People were then invited to Hinckley United Reformed Church for refreshing drinks and mountains of buttered hot cross buns. Kathy (Hinckley URC) commented, "We've never had so many in for it". Several Christian leaders from the community led walkers in prayer, praise and an Easter message. These included Derek Marvin (Churches Together chair & Trinity Ln),



Rev Ian Hill (St Marys), Paul Wake (Hinckley URC) and Simon Cooper (CEO of Refreshment UK). Readings were done by Cobb, David Mayor Councillor Robin Webber-Jones and Deborah Cox. Hymns in the Market Square were accompanied by the Salvation Army band.

The walk was certainly a witness through the streets of Hinckley, especially during a busy Friday Castle Street market. Stall holder, Geoff, said, "You certainly couldn't miss you lot. I loved it." The Power of Prayer, part 1 by Paul Wake

Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.

1 Thessalonians 5:16-18 NIV

In the Lord's Prayer we are certainly given the model of a perfect prayer. It contains elements of adoration & praise, confession, thanksgiving and supplication. More of these in later parts.

Prayer is one of the cornerstones of Christian faith, yet it is so personal. Open or clasped hands? Silent or out loud? Is there a right or wrong way to pray? Rather than getting caught up in the mechanics of praying, perhaps the most crucial point of all is that we pray in the first place.

If prayer is two-way communication with God, then silence while actively listening during prayer is just as important as relaying what lays on our hearts to Him.

May the Lord forgive my scepticism, but I doubt any Christian that tells me they pray enough. I once knew a church leader who admonished his flock for giving thanks for a space in the car park. Yet the Lord invites us to bring all those things laid on our hearts to Him. Who are we to judge others for their concerns and anxieties? I am sure if we remembered some of the concerns we had as children they would likely seem trivial to us now. When we are called to pray for one another, so we should never suppress another's judge one prayers. or Instead, we should be encouraged.

CHRISTIAN AID WEEK. 11 - 18 MAY

For 80 years, Christian Aid has worked disadvantaged among the most across the world to communities relieve poverty, suffering and injustice and to campaign for human rights and environmental sustainability. With its roots in Christian faith and principles, Christian Aid believes in the dignity of every human being. This year's Christian Aid Week appeal focusses on helping indigenous communities whose livelihood and survival are threatened by climate change.

In many countries, the climate crisis is causing both the dry and the rainy seasons, that would once arrive with predictability, to intensify and shift erratically. As a result, vital crops are failing, plunging farming families into hunger and poverty.



Inbeloved grandchildren - has known this land for most of her life, farming to support her family and neighbours. But she has witnessed radical changes. This is her story:

"When I came to the forest, there was lots of water close to the community, and it wasn't that hot. Today, it's a different story. Our water resources are drying up. It means we cannot water the crops and there is no food production. Climate change has been killing our crops, and this is our food."

But the unstoppable power of hope is hands of farmers like in the Aurelia. She's leading her community in the fight to overcome the challenges they face by sharing skills and knowledge gained from Christian Aid's agricultural training with their partner, Congcoop. Together, thev are cultivating native seeds, conserving water and producing fertiliser to make their farming practices more climate resilient. But Aurelia and her community shouldn't be tackling this alone.

Our gifts can fund vital training and supply the tools which are required. House Group By Heather C

At the monthly Wednesday night house group, we have recently started the Gospel of Luke. Typically, we usually use a Bible commentary to give us insights into the passages. March. tried something we In different, journalling. bible Bible journalling is a technique and craft activity to help individuals pull out the key moments or messages from the passages that they are reading. Basically, there are three steps: read, reflect, represent. So initially we read and then listened* to two passages from Luke, before pulling out keywords, and then key phrases that we thought stood out for us as individuals being as the most important. These may be a verse, phrase, or form the key message to take to heart from the passage. It could also be what you might share with another individual.





We then entered on the crafty bit for the remainder of the session. Journalling Bibles have wide side margins to be used to record the message that comes from reading the passage, not in a note form or bullet points, but in an more illustrative or diagrammatic way such as simple drawings or illustrated texts. It does not need to be perfect or clever, just something that means something to the creator - a take home message. Having applied the passage to a meaningful visual and personal representation, it may remain in the memory longer than a thought or a note. Some ideas are shown here along with our efforts. Having not had any warning that they were going to try this, some in our group enjoyed, others not so keen, but all had a go. So Bible Journalling will for not be everyone, but you might like to try.
